

SEVERE WEATHER AND CYCLONE INFORMATION

Australia's Tropical Cyclone season runs from 1st November to 30th April. According to the Bureau of Meteorology (BOM), "the most cyclone-prone area is the north-west coast between Broome and Exmouth. Tropical cyclones cross this coast more often than anywhere else around the continent. However, other areas of Australia including North Queensland and the Top End also get a high number of tropical cyclones".

If you live in North Queensland, it's important to prepared for cyclones and other severe weather events. Following is some information in from the Bureau of Meteorology (BOM) Website and other reputable sources to assist you in assembling a cyclone contingency plan for your household.

CYCLONE ALERTS

Cyclone Watch


When the Bureau of Meteorology (BOM) issues a Cyclone Watch, this indicates regions in the shaded **Watch Zone** on the Tropical Cyclone Forecast Track Map are expected to experience gales within 24-48 hours.

Cyclone Warning

When the Bureau of Meteorology (BOM) issues a Cyclone Warning, this indicates regions in the shaded **Warning Zone** on the Tropical Cyclone Forecast Track Map are expected to experience gales within 24 hours.

When a Cyclone Warning is issued, residents should take immediate precautions to safeguard lives and property.

Cyclone Watch	Cyclone Warning	Severe Weather Warning
A cyclone watch is issued at six (6) hourly intervals if a cyclone or potential cyclone exists, and there is a likelihood gale force winds or stronger will affect coastal or island communities within the next 24 to 48 hours.	A cyclone warning is issued at three (3) hourly intervals if gale force winds or stronger are expected to affect coastal or island communities within the next 24 hours. Warnings are updated every hour when a cyclone is close to landfall. The Standard Emergency Warning Signal (SEWS) may be used with some cyclone warnings.	A severe weather warning may be issued if the system is no longer a cyclone but communities are still being threatened by damaging winds, flooding rains or pounding seas.

CYCLONE TERMINOLOGY

Cyclone Categories

The severity of a tropical cyclone is ranked in categories from 1 (weakest) to 5 (strongest). The category given to a cyclone is based on its maximum mean wind speed. It doesn't indicate the severity of other hazards the cyclone may bring. For example, a Category 1 cyclone can have significant impact through heavy rain and flooding. Refer to the guide below.

Category	Maximum Mean Wind (km/h)	Typical Strongest Gusts (km/h)	Typical Effects
1	63 - 88	₹125	Damaging winds. Negligible house damage. Damage to some crops, trees and caravans. Boats may drag moorings.
2	89 - 117	125 - 164	Destructive winds. Minor house damage. Significant damage to signs, trees and caravans. Heavy damage to some crops. Risk of power failure. Small craft may break moorings.
3	118 - 159	165 - 224	Very destructive winds. Some roof and structural damage. Some caravans destroyed. Power failures likely.
4	160 - 199	225 - 279	Significant roofing loss and structural damage. Many caravans destoyed and blown away. Dangerous airborne debris. Widespread power failures.
5	> 200	> 279	Extremely dangerous with widespread destruction.
